The Sights and Sounds of Worship and St. Mark's

How we worship at St. Mark's may be unfamiliar to you. Know that everything in our worship space has purpose and meaning: to help us focus on the resurrected, living Lord Jesus who welcomes all into his house.

The room you are sitting in for worship is called the nave. The word nave comes from the medieval Latin word *navis*, meaning ship. If you look at the ceiling, you can see that it resembles the inverted hull of a ship. This architecture is deliberate, as the ship has long been a symbol of Christ's Church.

Throughout the nave are stained-glass windows. Historically, windows like these have been a way of communicating the stories of the scriptures. At St. Mark's, each window on the right and left side of the nave depicts a scene from the Old Testament and a corresponding scene from the New Testament. Some of the smaller windows remember saints of the church. The triptych (group of three windows) above the altar shows the risen and reigning Jesus flanked by the Virgin Mary and St. John, the beloved disciple.

During the seasons of Advent and Christmas, the Chrismon Tree enhances our worship space. The tree is adorned with white and gold *Chrismon* ornaments. Chrismon means "Christ monogram" and the ornaments represent the name, life, or saving acts of Jesus Christ in some way. Many of the symbols used on the tree are ancient, but the practice of putting them on a tree is relatively modern – the first Chrismon Tree was created in 1957 for the Lutheran Church of the Ascension in Danville, VA.

As the worship procession begins, the congregation will stand. Worship at St. Mark's includes standing at various times because we are worship participants, not simply spectators. We also stand in worship because standing is the posture of the Resurrection, and Christians are people of the resurrected Lord.

As the procession enters, you may notice that the worship leaders are wearing different robes. The various robes have different historic meanings and names. Their basic purpose, however, is to help give worship leaders a more uniform appearance so that their personal attire won't be a distraction to worshipers.

Again, we are happy you are here. It is good to be worshipping together. Welcome to St. Mark's!

About This Evening's Service

Carols by Candlelight is a "Festival Service of Lessons and Carols." You may be wondering what that means. It is a festival service because we are anticipating the celebration of Christmas, one of the principal feasts, or holy days, of the church. Lessons are simply the readings from scripture that you will hear throughout the service, and carols are the music that we hear and sing, either from instrumentalists, the choir, or from the congregation. Carols are, informally, songs about Christmas. Later in the bulletin you'll see some music labelled as hymns and some as carols; this is to help identify music sung by everyone (hymns) rather than just the choir (carols).

The traditional Service of Lessons and Carols consists of opening prayers, nine lessons followed by two carols each, and closing prayers. This service was developed in 1880 for use at Truro Cathedral in England, and was made famous by King's College, Cambridge, England, where the service has been held nearly every year since 1918. *Carols by Candlelight* uses the basic form of that service and adds reflections (short spoken pieces) that help create a narrative and weave together the lessons and the music. The inclusion of reflections in our *Carols by Candlelight* service was inspired by the hymn festivals offered by St. Olaf College in Minnesota.



Luke 2:1-20 *St. Luke tells of the birth of Jesus.*

LESSON

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. 
O Holy Night

LESSON


John 1:1-14 St. John unfolds the great mystery of the Incarnation.


